

Global launch of the WHO Global Report on Health Equity for Persons with Disabilities

Background

More than 1 billion people around the world experience disability (about 15% of the global population), with this number expected to increase. People with disabilities face many health inequities and challenges in the health sector: from inequitable service delivery models to inaccessible public health interventions, and little consideration during health emergencies.

The Sustainable Goals will only be achieved if we plan a stronger, more sustainable, and efficient health sector for all. Given the high prevalence of disability worldwide, disability inclusion represents a fundamental and strategic driver for achieving health and well-being for all at all ages.

During the 2021 World Health Assembly, Member States recognized the urgent need to build a disability inclusive health sector. They adopted WHA Resolution 74.8 on the highest attainable standard of health for persons with disabilities, in which one of the requests was to develop a Global Report on the highest attainable standard of health for persons with disabilities, to provide:

- Updated WHO estimates of the global disability prevalence.
- Economic analyses highlighting that disability inclusive health interventions are an essential investment.
- Evidence of the complex and cumulative health inequities that persons with disabilities experience.
- Actionable recommendations.

The key messages of this Global Report are:

- Persons with disabilities experience unacceptable health inequities.
- Health equity for persons with disabilities is a States obligation.
- Disability affects a large proportion of the population.
- Addressing health equity for persons with disabilities will advance the achievement of global health priorities.
- Addressing health equity for persons with disabilities benefits everyone.
- Health equity contributes to meaningful participation in society.
- Health equity for persons with disabilities is an investment worth making.

The Global report on health equity for persons with disabilities will be launched on **Friday 2 December 2022** (coinciding with International Day of Persons with Disabilities on 3 December 2022), with participation of persons with disabilities, global health leaders, Member States, and health sector partners.

Aim of the global launch

The global launch aims to raise awareness on health equity for persons with disabilities and mobilize action across a range of stakeholders (including national governments, international civil society organizations, development agencies as well as other health sector partners). The specific objectives of the launch are to:

 Share the key messages of the Global report on health equity for persons with disabilities, particularly for Member States with Disabilities: Concept note



- Highlight the importance of including persons with disabilities in health sector planning, development, implementation and monitoring to ensure effective health systems strengthening
- Outline opportunities for countries and health sector partners to act to address long-standing health inequities for persons with disabilities through the sharing of personal experiences

Proposed WHO launch event

To mark the release of the Global report on health equity for persons with disabilities, a hybrid event (face-to-face at WHO Headquarters and broadcast online) is proposed. This launch event will include speeches and a panel discussion, with the target audience as:

- Ministries of Health of WHO Member States
- Civil society organizations, including those representing persons with disabilities
- People with lived experience of disability
- International organizations and health sector partners including service providers
- General public
